### **ANNUAL ROUNDTABLE DISCUSSION & USED EQUIPMENT SALE A SUCCESS!**

Thanks to the generosity of *Adair Photography* and others who donated equipment to the club for sale, we realized a pretty darned good increase in our club treasury! However, I suspect that most sales by other members were minimal or non-existent. I believe a good reason is that most of the merchandise brought to the sale was too old to be of value to most of us. Should we require all sale merchandise be no more than 20 years old? Perhaps that's a future discussion point for our board...

**\*\* Update** Joshua Tree National Monument—Keys Ranch Trips **Update\*\***

The dates for the two field trips planned for October to Keys Ranch in Joshua Tree National Monument are Thursday, **October 7<sup>th</sup>** and Saturday **October 23<sup>rd</sup>**. These limited-participant trips are full, so this information is for those already signed up.

Please note that there has been a time change from that originally announced.

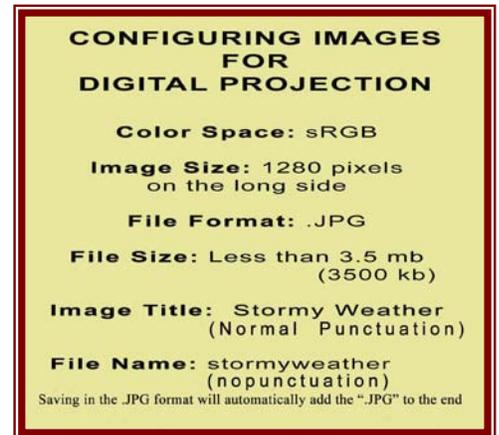
**This is the time change: Please note!** *These are early morning trips.* **We are required to be at the gate for Keys Ranch at 6:45 am, and our guide will take us in at 7:00.** Our shooting time is 7:00 to 9:00, and our twelve participants will be the only ones there, other than the volunteer guide. We can have tripods, which are not allowed on regular Keys Ranch tours.

We should carpool as much as possible, as there's only so much space to park at the gate. **Also, we have to pay entrance fees of \$15 per car, for those not having an annual pass or Golden Access Pass** (for us old codgers).

It is about 80 miles from Redlands to the Keys Ranch gate. When I did a dry run for time and mileage, it took about 1.5 hours. Early morning may be faster, but I would allow a little extra time, just in case. Carpoolers should plan to meet at 4:45 am (yikes!) at the latest, to leave by 5:00 at the latest. Meet at Coco's in Redlands.

Directions: Go east on I-10 to Hwy 62, going north toward Joshua Tree and 29 Palms.

Continue on Hwy 62 into the town of Joshua Tree and turn right on Park Street, following the signs to JTNM. Continue on Park, passing the entrance kiosk (paying if they are open), and stay on the same road, past Hidden Valley Campground, to a fork in the road. Go left toward Keys Ranch, following the signs. There is a locked gate with parking. We will be met there by our guide. **Be there by 6:45! If you aren't there when our guide takes us in, you can't go in later on your own.**

### PRINT EXHIBIT RULES

The work must be yours, a current member of RCC.

It must be ready to hang using wire eyes & wire;  
no saw tooth hangers.

You may use a frameless presentation.

Your name, title of the picture, and sale price (if for sale) must be on the back.

There is a \$3.00 fee for each work hung: cash or check.

Work left for another hanging will be charged again.

Work removed but not retrieved after a new hanging will be charged a \$3.00 storage fee.

Work unclaimed within 60 days of removal will be considered abandoned and become the property of Redlands Camera Club for disposal or sale at its sole discretion.

### Photoshop & Elements tip: Turn the Background Layer into a Regular Layer

By default, your Background Layer is locked and you can't move it. But by double-clicking on its gray area in the Layer Palette, the New Layer dialogue box will appear with "Layer 0" highlighted.

You may either leave it named as such, or rename it to something more meaningful to you. Click the OK button and it's now a Regular Layer.

### Photoshop & Elements tip: Performance Preferences

Two adjustments in Preferences in *Photoshop* or *Elements* can help improve performance. Go to *Edit > Preferences > Performance* to make the adjustments.

Memory Usage can let you specify how much of your RAM you would like to dedicate to the use of *Photoshop* or *Elements*. Naturally, you would like to use whatever is left after your computer uses that which is needed to run the rest of your system.

You also have the option of setting up a Scratch Disk. Think of a Scratch Disk as temporary RAM created by using actual hard drive space. It is employed after your RAM is filled up.

Adobe suggests this Scratch Disk not be on the C: drive; so assigning it to a second hard drive is preferred.

### **Photoshop & Elements tip:**

#### **Differences between Flatten Image, Merge Visible, and Merge Down commands**

The *Flatten Image* command will flatten all layers, blending layers that are visible and discarding layers that are not visible.

If you use the *Flatten Image* command the appearance of the image should not change.

The *Merge Visible* command will merge all layers that are currently visible, keeping separate only layers that are not currently visible (eye is no longer checked).

The *Merge Visible* command should not change the appearance of the image, with the understanding that of course the image has changed in appearance to some extent by virtue of the fact that you've turned off the visibility of some layers.

But when you apply the *Merge Visible* command the currently visible layers will be flattened, so the appearance of the resulting image should not change.

When you make the additional layers visible the appearance of the image may very well change, but the merged layers should appear the same after they are flattened.

The *Merge Down* command will merge the current layer with the layer directly below. The *Merge Down* command is the one that is most likely to create a change in appearance.

This command will merge the current layer with the layer below it.

This can have significant effects on the appearance of the image.

For example, if the layer that is currently selected is an adjustment layer, and the layer below is one image in a composite, when you *Merge Down* only the layer directly below the adjustment layer will be affected by that adjustment layer, and the layers below will not be affected.

#### **Reduce Noise using Layer Stacks (Photoshop only)**

Noise is rarely in exactly the same place from one picture to another.

So take multiple exposures (three to five is good) of the same image.

Photoshop will search for the differences between the exposures and blend them, keeping what stays the same and eliminating what is different (the noise spots).

Go to *Open>Scripts>Load Files into Stack*.

In the dialogue box that appears, Browse to find your multiple exposures to open.

Check the *Attempt to Automatically Align Source Images*

and *Create Smart Object after Loading Layers* boxes, then click OK.

Next, select *Smart Objects>Stack Mode>Mean* or *Median*.

Mean works best for images with no motion in them;

Median is best for images with some motion

(tripods aren't required, but a steady hand is helpful).

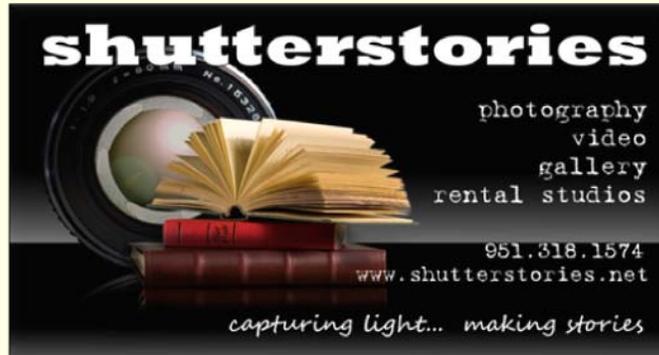
Sit back and watch Photoshop work its magic!

Random noise between the exposures will be reduced substantially, maybe even dramatically. However, this technique won't eliminate fixed noise, hot pixels, or column and row noise.

The most challenging part of this technique is identifying situations where noise will be prevalent (like large blue skies) and remembering to make those multiple exposures.

### **Photoshop & Elements tip: Why Adjustment Layers vs. Adjustments?**

Levels, Curves, Brightness/Contrast, Hue/Saturation, etc.

Adjustment Layers (*Layer > New Adjustment Layer*) provide a significant benefit in flexibility and image quality over adjustments made directly to the Background image layer (such as: PHOTOSHOP: *Image > Adjustments* or ELEMENTS: *Enhance > Adjust Lighting*).

Adjustment Layers do not significantly enlarge the file size.

The layer size is small, since they do not directly affect the actual pixels, but are merely a set of instructions on how to modify them.

Conversely, adjustments to the Background image layer change the pixel values – permanently, once the file is saved.

Adjustment Layers are non-destructive.

You will always have the ability to change their effects to the image.

With adjustments to the Background image layer, if you make five different adjustments, then later decide to modify one of them, you must scrap them all and begin anew.

Adjustment Layers allow you to return to each one separately for tweaking.

Adjustment Layers offer the ability to click the eye on and off, thereby showing you the Before and After effects of those adjustments.

Applying multiple adjustments directly to the Background image layer creates the potential to gradually reduce the amount of information in an image.

This can eventually lead to some level of posterization (the loss of smooth gradations of tone or color).

For example, if you apply a *Levels* adjustment, then go back and adjust several more times to fine-tune the image, you will introduce a more degrading effect than if you had used a single Adjustment Layer of *Levels* and tweaked it several times.

Regardless of how many times you tweak an Adjustment Layer, it only counts as a single adjustment and does not compound the effect in terms of posterization.

An Adjustment Layer automatically includes a Layer Mask.

It's the white box to the right of the adjustment icon in the layer.

By clicking on it, then selecting a Brush size, you can fine-tune the adjustment to local areas within the image.

For example, if you brightened the image using *Levels*, but don't want it to effect one area, you could Mask that area by brushing over it – even to the point of changing the Opacity of the mask so the effect was cut by 40% or 70%.

### **Photography tip: Hyperfocal Distance**

Call it a *zone of acceptable sharpness*.

It is a useful feature that is the function of the lens focal length, aperture (*f*-stop), and distance.

When you focus your lens, there will be a zone that *appears* to be in focus, and areas that are out of focus.

The area that appears to be in focus is called the *zone of acceptable sharpness*.

While technically it's not in focus (only the actual point of focus is), most of this zone is sharp enough that it *appears* to be in focus.

When you focus on a subject, one third of the *zone of acceptable sharpness* is between that point and the camera, and two thirds of the zone is behind the point of focus.

Here's one way to use it: when shooting landscapes, use the Rule Of Thirds and focus at a point near the bottom third line.

That way you will get an additional area in front of distant objects that *appears to be sharp*.

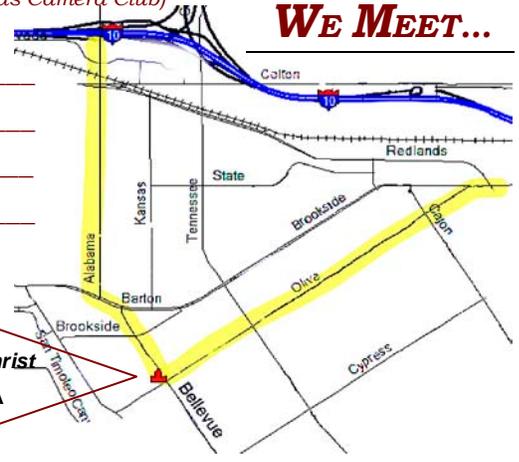
