For example, our next Members' Night will be on October 21st. The submittal form will be accessible on the RCC website beginning at 9:00 a.m. on Oct. 14th, and will be deactivated at Noon on the 21st.

To access the submittal form, go to the Photo Portal link of the RCC website's entry page. The link to the form will be on that screen.



Here is the info you must fill out to submit up to two images.

Click on the Browse button to navigate to your computer's folder and file name of the image(s) to be shared.

Do not bring your images to the meeting on CDs or flash drives; they will not be accepted!

October 4 – 5: Photography and camera equipment is allowed. Just keep in mind that all bags will be searched. Also, in order to keep the entry lines moving along, you'll want to bring what is only absolutely needed. The size of the bags and backpacks listed under Prohibited Items is only a guidance request (we don't want people bringing giant duffle bags). There is no special permission required. You also want to keep in mind that if you're in the Preferred Seating areas, you can't block the view of other patrons.

Gates open to the public at 10 a.m. daily. A radio-controlled aircraft demonstration takes place from 10 to 11 a.m.

The Civilian flight performances begin at 11 a.m. and continue until about 4 to 4:30 p.m.

Directions from Redlands

1. Head West on the I-10 freeway to the I-215 interchange, about 6.0 miles
2. Take the I-215 S. toward Riverside, stay on I-215 (signs for CA-60 E. San Diego/Indio), about 5.5 miles
3. At the 60 E interchange near Moreno Valley, keep right to stay on I-215 S., follow signs for interstate 215 S. San Diego, about 30.5 miles
4. Near Temecula, merge onto I-15 S, about 47.6 miles
5. Take the Pomerado Rd./Miramar Rd for **Main Gate**, about 0.3 miles
6. Turn right onto Miramar Rd, about 322 ft
7. Turn left onto Kearny Mesa Rd, about 305 ft. Destination will be on the right

Private Redlands Camera Club Image Sharing Site on MyFamily.com

Our newest free benefit for club members is up and running. The Redlands Camera Club's MyFamily website gives each club member an opportunity to post images, to receive comments and/or critiques of images, to comment on other members' images, and to critique other members' images. This is a closed system available only to our club members via individual passwords. In addition to sharing and critiquing images the site will allow for other messages, alerts, and calendar services for our club.

You must gain access to our private site via the link on the invitation email. Going directly to MyFamily.com will not get you in. There is no cost to individual members. The club has already paid the fee for the private site.

Saving large files (excerpted from Ask Tim Grey eNewsletter July 15, 2013)

Question: I've been trying to save panoramas that I stitched in Photoshop CS5, and they happen to be over 2GB. Photoshop states that anything over 2GB can't be saved. Is there any way to save them?

Answer: There most certainly is a way to save files over 2GB in Photoshop. In fact, you can save files that are up to 4 exabytes (that's about 4 billion gigabytes) in Photoshop.

To begin with, you can save the images in the TIFF file format, which allows you to save files up to 4GB each rather than the 2GB file size limitation for Photoshop PSD files. However, you can save even larger files by utilizing the Photoshop PSB (as in Big) file format.

In current versions of Photoshop you can save a large file as a PSB file by simply choosing the Large Document Format option from the Format popup in the Save As dialog. In earlier versions of Photoshop you needed to turn on the "Enable Large Document Format (.psb)" checkbox in the File Handling section of the Preferences dialog in order to enable the option to save in the PSB file format.

The bottom line is that it is possible in Photoshop to save files that are larger than the largest hard drives available today. That, of course, begs the question of whether you need such a large file. You could theoretically flatten the final image if you're certain it is final, or convert it to 8-bit per channel mode rather than 16-bit per channel mode, for example.

But I appreciate the value of having layers intact for the maximum amount of information available in my original captures, which is where the Large Document Format (Photoshop PSB) file format provides a solution.

Changing the Color Profile of an Image

(May be required to set sRGB for RCC projection)

First, make sure that you're working with a flattened document. Files that are not flattened tend to create strange color shifts when you change the profile.

Photoshop

Go to **Edit > Convert to Profile**.

Select the new color profile (sRGB) from the "Destination Space" drop-down and click **OK** to commit to your changes.

Elements

Go to **Image > Convert Color Profile > Convert to sRGB Profile**.

Now when you submit images for projection at RCC, the colors will look much closer to what you saw at home because most projectors (including RCC's) use only the sRGB color space.

Configuring Images for Digital Projection

Color Space: sRGB

PSMap: Edit>Assign Profiles>Working RGB=sRGB
Elements: Image>Convert Color Profile>Convert to sRGB Profile

Horizontal Image Size

1280 pixels on long side

Vertical Image Size

768 pixels on long side

File Size

Less than 3.5 mb (3500 kb)

Image Title

Stormy Weather (normal punctuation)

File Name

stormyweather (no punctuation)

Saving in the .JPG format will automatically add the .jpg to the end of the file
